History at KATE for school students

Old telephones, a railway lantern and old Old telephones, a railway lantern and old photographs of children in Khandallah were learning experiences for St Benedict's School students on their recent history field trip. Last week three classes of students rang-ing in age from 5 to 7 visited the former Khandallah Automatic Telephone Exchange (KATE), now the home of the Onslow Historic Society. They were met by Hugh Bibby, his cousin Claire Bibby, and newly elected Onslow Historic Society president Felicity Wong. Hugh showed the children his collection of old telephones, and explained how they

High showed the children his collection of old telephones, and explained how they were once wired from people's homes to the telephone exchange and demonstrated the meaning of telephone language by dialing, ringing, and hanging up. He also demonstrated how coloured glass in a hand-held lantern was used to guide train drivers to stop and go. Claire shared photographs of Khandallah children 125 years ago playing outdoors. Felicity prepared a map for the students to take home of places to visit, such as the former Ngatote kumara gardens, the Bridle Track, horse trough and interesting local buildings.
